A Path to Peace: Interview with HPCA's Resident Acupuncturist

Denise Saad, a long time Hyde Park resident, began treating her patients in her home in 2010. Since 2010 her clinic has grown to a community clinic model, and People's Acupuncture Tx is now located at 1417 Richmond Ave, Suite B. The clinic has a total of three acupuncturists, allowing it to be open 6 days a week, all day long. They currently treat about 100 patients a week. Tell me about how you first became interested in studying acupuncture?

When I was in elementary school, I did an acupuncture project. I don't remember why, but my mom still has it sitting in the house. It is a Styrofoam head, and I got pins and put them on the meridians. I don't know how I got interested in it, but that's what I did. Later in life, I was doing a lot of Kung Fu and Tai Chi, and I wanted to know more about energy moving through the body. I lived near an acupuncture school, and I knew people going to it. I wanted to know more about energy, and I had a pretty flexible job, so I decided to enroll in school and see what it is all about. I got into school, quit my job, and decided to do school full time.

Tell me about the journey to becoming an acupuncturist? What's the education involved?

It is a four-year master's degree. You learn a lot of Western medicine in it, because you need to know how to refer out if you see people with serious conditions. In the State of Texas you are required to have an herbal degree as well – so you do a lot of herbal medicine, along with the acupuncture part of it.

How would you describe acupuncture to someone who knows nothing about it?

You have pathways of energy flowing through the body, and when the energy gets stuck in one of those pathways you get sick in different ways. Acupuncture helps get the energy moving through those pathways better.

Do you have any myths or misconceptions about acupuncture that you would like to clear up for people?

People think it might hurt. It really doesn't hurt most of the time. Sometimes you might hit a nerve or a blood vessel and might get a little shock, but it doesn't really hurt. The needles are very thin and they're not like the hypodermic needles that you get shots with from your doctor.

It's not magic. It can do magical things, but it's not going to cure cancer or cure fatal illnesses. It is really about getting the body to work better than what it's doing.

How does Eastern medicine philosophy differ from Western medicine philosophy? How do you get it to work together?

Chinese medicine is more preventive. Whereas if you break your arm, you don't go to an acupuncturist, you go to the doctor. If you get something like a cold, acupuncture and herbs have a better chance of getting you better faster. It isn't masking the symptoms, and really boosting the immune system so you can kick the cold faster. Western medicine masks things more. If you have pain, here's a pain killer – not 'let's get the inflammation down' and get the circulation to heal the wound.

What kinds of issues do patients seek treatment for?

I see a lot of everything. I'm usually a person's last resort. They've been to every doctor and had every test done, and they're still feeling bad and looking for an alternative because they didn't get relief from everywhere else they've tried. I see things seasonally – cold season I see a lot of colds, in the spring people are more active and so I will see more sports injuries. I also see people for fertility, headaches, and a lot of stress and anxiety.

What can a patient expect during a visit?

We talk about any issues the patient might be having. Try and see if any connections can be made with their symptoms. Western medicine sees each thing individually, but with Chinese medicine we look at the pattern of what's going on. Then we check a person's pulse and tongue. That shows what the body is doing. From there, we put needles in the spots that need it. At my clinic people get to keep the needles in as long as they want.

How does that differ from other clinics?

Well my clinic is a community clinic. Which means that everyone gets treated in the same room, in the same space [after a private consultation]. Whereas a more traditional treatment would be a private room setting.

What made you choose that clinic model?

Personally, I like community clinic treatments better when I am getting treatments. I like having other people around. I like the feeling of the group. With community style, you can be more flexible with how much you charge people – so we do a sliding scale. When I moved to Houston, I was really worried because there was a lot of acupuncture clinics here and there's a school. I thought it would have a hard time, but there weren't any community clinics here when I showed up. It seemed the perfect thing to introduce to Houston.

How often should people come, and when should a patient see results?

In general, we tell people to come once a week for about a month. We will then reevaluate to see how people are responding. Some people notice changes right away, whereas other people it's not until they go home and have a good night's sleep or move around a bit before they notice a difference. If someone has something acute going on, like someone fell and they are having trouble walking, they can come twice a week for a short period of time.

How do the herbs work in conjunction with acupuncture?

The herbs continue your treatment while you're not there. If you're lacking something to make the body do the right thing, they add to the treatment. For a cold we might offer an antiviral herbal that will help clear it out faster. Allergies are where the herbs work really well. If you're congested, it can keep you from coughing and sneezing a lot. They are really a supplement to whatever you're treating in clinic.

What would you like to say to your Hyde Park neighbors?

What I like about this clinic is that we are a referral-based business. A lot of times someone will come and they really like it and they tell all their friends. Sometimes you come into the clinic and everyone knows everyone there. That's a really nice feeling. When I first moved, I had an ad in the [HPCA] newsletter, and that's how I met a bunch of neighbors that way. I found that to be really nice. It's nice being in a supportive neighborhood!

Hyde Park Christmas Balls

INGREDIENTS

- 1 and 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup Droste dutch-processes cocoa
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 stick unsalted butter, softened
- 1/3 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar
- 1/3 cup honey
- 3 and 1/2 squares of semi-sweet Scharffen Berger chocolate (approx. 7 oz.)
- crushed candy cane (put the candy cane in a zip lock bag and use a wooden spoon or rolling pin to crush)



DIRECTIONS

- 1.) Combine flour, cocoa, salt and baking soda in a bowl and use a whisk to mix thoroughly.
- 2.) In a second bowl, cream butter and sugar. Beat on medium until thoroughly combined. Add honey and beat on medium until light and fluffy. Slowly add dry ingredients from Step 1 a few tablespoons at a time and beat on low until combined. It will be a very stiff dough, and you will need to progress slowly and scrape the bowl as needed.
- 3.) Roughly chop the chocolate and fold into the dough. Cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes.
- 4.) Preheat the oven to 350F.
- 5.) Use a teaspoon to scoop the dough. Form into a ball with your fingers or roll in the palm of your hands. Roll in crushed candy cane. Place on cookie sheet 1 and 1/2 inches apart. You can fit 24 to 28 balls on each cookie sheet.
- 6.) Bake on the middle rack for 9 minutes. Let cool. Use spatula to remove from cookie sheet.

Makes approx. 80-84 balls. You can refrigerate the dough for up to a week or freeze it for up to a month.




Hyde Park Civic Association – 2019 Monthly Meeting Schedule
