WHAT'S GOING ON

Our September general meeting was dedicated to hosting the candidates for City Council District C. I really enjoyed the event and hope that those of you in attendance got something valuable out of this chance to interact with the people running to lead in City government. The eight candidates in attendance each demonstrated that they are dedicated to public service and are interested in hearing directly from us.

In our meeting recap, you will find a copy of the eight questions that were posed to the candidates. We were not able to write down the candidates' responses. I attempted to prepare questions that covered a wide array of issues facing members of our community. The questions covered the lack of attention being paid to improving transportation options in and around Montrose, the rising tide of gun violence and violence linked to

white supremacy, and the management of the City's financial responsibilities were just a few of the topics we covered. The candidates were each given a question to which to respond and another question to provide a rebuttal. I think the format worked well to allow a variety of views to be expressed and show what kind of debating abilities these candidates possess. Following the round of questions, we revisited a few that were of particular interest to the residents and the candidates.

We will invite the candidates back to National Night Out so you may be able to ask them questions there as well.

September HPCA Meeting Minutes

The meeting of September 3, 2019 was brought to order by Vice President Chris Delphin at 7:00 pm. Chris reminded everyone that National Night Out is coming up soon and that lots of volunteers are needed to make it a success. This year NNO will be on October 1st at Lamar Park from 6-8 pm.

A representative from Sarah Davis' office informed everyone about the Propositions we will be voting on this year. For a list of these propositions, you can go to <http://tlc.texas.gov/docs/amendments/analyses19.pdf>.

Eight of the nine candidates running for City Council District C were present at our meeting. A list of the candidates in attendance, their pictures and websites is below. Chris decided the plan would be to ask a selected candidate a prepared question and then choose another candidate for rebuttal. We printed the questions that were asked to the candidates. All candidates handled their questions well. Towards the end of the meeting, the audience was asked to participate by asking their own questions. Managing Houston's homelessness crisis, infrastructure issues, property taxes and gun violence were some of the topics discussed.

Chris brought the meeting to an end by saying we hope our representative will help us in the future.

DISTRICT C QUESTIONS

1. Many people refer to Hurricane Harvey as a "wake-up call" for the City. However, we experienced catastrophic flooding two years running beforehand (and severe drought for a few years before that). What steps will you take to change the mentality in Houston away from solely reacting to climate change and superstorms?
2. Gun violence has become a daily occurrence for Houstonians. The news is full of stories about violent crime happening in and around our neighborhood. Incidences of suicide and other deaths by guns are often overlooked by the media. State and national politicians appear paralyzed to take meaningful action. What role

do you see for Houston, particularly City Council, in the debate on combating the rise of gun violence?

3. Many commentators criticize the City of Houston's lack of budget discipline to provide promised city services and fund its pension obligations. The Mayor has pointed to the 2004 revenue cap as the reason recurring expenses outstrip revenues. As a member of City Council you will confront another financial problem: a \$2.4 billion unfunded liability for retiree health care costs. Beyond balanced budgets, what will you propose to enact true reform for how Houston manages its financial responsibilities?
4. Our City faces a homelessness crisis. This neighborhood is ground zero to an LGBTQ population that suffers chronic housing insecurity. Other areas of District C experience similar, if not so particular, types of homelessness. What kinds of City programs or public-private partnerships will you push to assist local efforts to make our neighborhood a safe place for all residents?
5. Treatment strategies for those living with HIV lags in Houston. After learning they have the disease, Houstonians face serious hurdles to getting care. A lack of public transportation makes going to the doctor more difficult. The cost of medications can be prohibitive, especially in Texas, which has the highest uninsured rate in the nation. What would you propose to help the City address these inequities and rise to the ranks of San Francisco and New York City in deftly managing the disease's impact for the poor and marginalized?
6. As the City debates the costs and benefits for the reconstruction of I-45, and METRO pushes forward plans for a light rail system to Hobby Airport, little attention is being paid to address the growing needs of improved transportation options in and around Montrose. What kind of advocacy will you bring to City Hall to address the issues of a dilapidating infrastructure and congestion?
7. Since 2017, more than 230 incidents of hateful propaganda have been reported in communities across Texas. It would be naïve to believe that Houston is immune to the rising tide of violence linked to white supremacy and homophobia. How will you represent the diversity of Hyde Park to push against the divisive language exhibited in our national discourse?
8. Hyde Park is undergoing massive changes. The neighborhood was once a community of bungalows dotted by small business. The neighborhood's population growth has fueled an increased tax revenue basis, but the City only seems marginally committed to improving the quality of life for that growing population. What would you do as a member of City Council to reverse the trend of low investment in parks and other forms of community infrastructure?



Did You Know?

Did You Know? – “Pumpkin Spice” is a mixture of nutmeg, cinnamon, ginger and cloves—all spices that humans have enjoyed in their food for 3,500 years. One of the earliest references to this type of blend as “pumpkin spice” is in a recipe for “Pumpkin spice cakes” posted in the Washington Post in 1936. Back then, a pumpkin spice dessert always contained pumpkin. Once McCormick started bundling common spices used in pumpkin pie as “pumpkin spice” in the 1960s, cooks began using it to flavor all kinds of dishes normally spiced similarly to pumpkin pie, such as a “Cream of Sweet Potato Soup” published in The Orlando Sentinel in 1995. The first reference to pumpkin spice coffee was in 1996 with Home Roast Coffee near Tampa, Florida brewing up “pumpkin spice” beans.
